Telling our Story

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Strong Selected for Global Youth Institute

Samantha Strong of the Greenwood FFA Chapter will join approximately 200 high school students from around the globe to participate in a three-day conference hosted by the World Food Prize Foundation. Strong will travel to Des Moines, Iowa, with her teacher to discuss the issues of food security and other agricultural issues with international experts and her peers. She will also tour cutting-edge industrial and research facilities and take part in discussions with global leaders in science, industry and policy.

She must research and write essays focusing on all aspects of food security to present and discuss her findings with international experts. Students will be placed in small groups to make it easier to discuss their research. These students have the opportunity to identify solutions to the

world's pressing issues with food security.

The students will tour industrial and research facilities such as Monsanto, Syngenta, DuPont Pioneer and Des Moines University's Global Health Program. These tours are designed to educate the students and hopefully spark their interest to continue learning how to solve the agricultural issues throughout the world.

The conference offers hands-on projects to encourage student involvement. These projects are based on community issues and problem solving. Students develop community-action checklists to help build a step-by-step list to achieve the end goal. Since 2009, students have participated in the Kids Care International Outreach training program. This

program has students package food aid for food-insecure populations.

At the end of the conference, Strong will attend the World Food Prize Laureate Award Ceremony. An award called the Nobel Prize for Food and Agriculture will be awarded in recognition of the individuals who have advanced human development by improving the quality, quantity or availability of food in the world. Strong will also have the opportunity to apply for the Borlaug-Raun international internship. This internship is an eight-week, hands-on experience, working with scientists and policy makers at leading research centers in Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East.

Pa. Proficiency Award Winners Recognized

INDIANAPOLIS — The National FFA Organization has announced FFA members who achieved an Agricultural Proficiency Award.

The Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through their supervised agricultural experiences, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers.

Students can compete for awards in 49 areas covering everything from agricultural communications to wildlife management.

Placement proficiency awards are given to those whose supervised agricultural experiences, or SAEs, are related to employment, apprenticeships, or internships at an agribusiness or agriculture-related organization.

Entrepreneurship proficiency awards are given to those whose SAEs are related to ownership of an agribusiness or agriculture-related enterprise.

Proficiency awards are given out at the local, state and national levels.

Participants in the National Agricultural Proficiency Awards program will receive a rating of National finalist, gold, silver, bronze, participant or disqualified.

Four national finalists are selected for each of the 49 award areas and will go on to compete for a national proficiency award. National Agricultural Proficiency Award winners are announced onstage during the National FFA Convention and Expo. Each national finalist receives a \$500 cash award and a plaque. National winners receive an additional \$500 award and a plaque. The Pennsylvania winners select-

FROM THE OFFICERS STATION

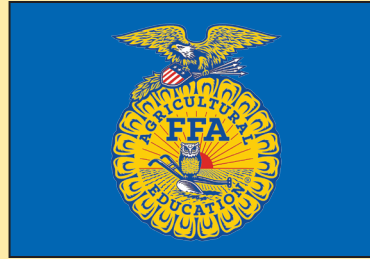
