National FFA Convention Sees Record Attendance

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — I remember my first trip to the National FFA Convention when I was in ninth grade. I had no idea what to expect from the trip, let alone all of the stuff that happens at nationals.

My first year at nationals, I had no idea about all of the competitions that take place, the official business that is conducted or the friendships that are formed with members from across the United States.

The 86th National FFA Convention was quite a convention, with a record attendance of 62,998 members, advisers and guests present. Not only was there a record attendance, but there was also a record number of American FFA degrees earned by members.

The American Degree is the highest degree that an FFA member can earn and requires a tremendous amount of dedication to a Supervised Agricultural Experience, participation in the FFA and service to the community. This year, 75 Pennsylvania FFA members earned their American degrees.

Pennsylvania also had three very special degrees awarded at the National FFA Convention. Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Matthew Meals; Gary Heckman of AgChoice Farm Credit; and Eric Cowden, the community outreach manager of the Marcellus Shale Coalition, each receive an honorary American FFA Degree. What happens when FFA alumni, industry leaders and public supporters come together? None other than the annual Blue and Gold Ball, a Pennsylvania FFA Alumni-sponsored event that directly benefits the Pennsylvania FFA Alumni First Year Jacket Campaign.

The night of the ball was Oct. 19 at the Sheraton Hotel, where 25 jackets were given to first-year FFA members.

The Pennsylvania FFA Alumni sponsor the same number of FFA jackets as the number of Keystone Degree recipients, the highest award a member can receive from the Pennsylvania FFA. The occasion commemorates the end of the FFA journey in Pennsylvania with the Keystone Degree and the beginning of new journeys in the FFA with the award of a FFA jacket to new members. Last year, the Pennsylvania FFA Alumni raised money for 302 jackets, equaling the 302 Keystone Degree recipients.

The Blue and Gold Ball is a prepaid event that hosts a dinner and dance for the attendees. In addition to the dinner, there is a silent auction where entries are bid on to further help the efforts of raising money for the Jacket Campaign. The auction carried everything from FFA memorabilia to in-kind donations.

Furthermore, local FFA chapters were encouraged to participate in the Pennsylvania FFA Alumni Chapter Basket Challenge. Chapters created themed baskets that were voted on by the attendees of the Blue and Gold Ball.

The themes ranged from Halloween goodies, to campfire necessities or fall creations. At the end of the night, the votes were tallied up and the winner of the Pennsylvania FFA Alumni Chapter Basket Challenge was the Big Spring FFA Chapter with their Halloween Candy Creation. The baskets were also a part of the silent auction and at the end of the night they were sold to the highest bidder.

Matt Dodson, Pennsylvania's National FFA officer candidate, gave remarks on behalf of the Pennsylvania FFA Association. His remarks included the fact and reminder that the FFA blue corduroy jacket was first selected as the main wear of the National FFA Organization 80 years ago at the fifth National FFA Convention, where it was first worn by the Fredericktown FFA chapter from Ohio. From there, it has to be one of the most recognizable symbols of the FFA.

The result of the Blue and Gold Ball was a successful impact on the lives of FFA members. The Pennsylvania FFA Association and the Pennsylvania FFA Alumni would like to thank all of the people who attended the Blue and Gold Ball and gave their support to the Pennsylvania FFA Alumni First Year Jacket Campaign.
