## Selinsgrove Member Selected for National Wildlife Contest

SELINGSGROVE, Pa. — Selins-

grove FFA member Brian Gray will represent Pennsylvania this October at the National FFA Conven-

tion. Gray submitted his wildlife placement proficiency application to the national competition. He was the only member from Pennsylvania to be selected to compete at the National Convention Oct. 19-26 held in Indianapolis, Ind.

Since Gray's freshmen year, he has been working to improve wildlife habitats. He started out building birdhouses and hanging them up around his farm. The following year he made brush piles for small animals to live in. He continues to

maintain these wildlife shelters as well as putting food plots out for the larger wildlife.

This is Gray's first year submitting the Wildlife Placement Proficiency. Last year he submitted one for Environmental Sciences and Natural Resources and won first in the state.

Gray said, "I was surprised to be selected as a finalist. I am very excited and proud to be representing Pennsylvania. I have worked hard on my wildlife record book for the

last four years. I have spent hundreds of hours improving wildlife habitats and learning all that I can about wildlife and natural resources." Gray has his hands full protecting the wildlife but he does a lot more than that. Gray is involved in soccer, track and field, ice hockey, band, hunting, fishing, and working on the family farm as well as at Tractor Supply Company.



LANCASTER, Pa. — The Pennsylvania Young Farmer Association (PYFA) has selected Amanda Harrington, a 2008 graduate of Penn Manor High School, Lancaster County, to attend the National Young Farmer Educational Institute in Baltimore, MD, Dec. 11-13.

Harrington will participate in the Young Ag Leaders Event (YALE), a leadership training program for the next generation of agricultural leaders.

This is the second year PYFA has sponsored young people to attend their national meeting as a way of forging closer relationships.

Linda Krall, PYFA president, said, "We look forward to having participation by FFA youth, providing them the opportunity to gain a national perspective about agriculture while they learn about potential career opportunities."

A member of Manor FFA, Harrington was chapter historian and competed in floriculture in the county career development contest, placing second. She showed lambs at the Lampeter Fair and the Pennsylvania Farm Show, and will show a steer at Lam-

peter Fair this fall. She was chair of the West Lampeter Pig Chase Committee.

Having received the FFA Keystone Degree in January, Harrington attended the National FFA Convention. She will major in agriculture education at Texas Tech University, beginning with the spring semester.

She credits her relatives with giving her opportunities on their farm and speaking positively about the benefits of being an FFA member. She furthered her interest by enrolling in the eighth grade agri-

culture club, then joining FFA. She said, "FFA is literally a life-changing experience."

She said she will use her opportunity to attend the NYEFA Institute to create a stronger relationship between the two organizations, and will share the knowledge gained there with local FFA members and FFA Alumni.

Also attending the national Institute will be Britney Marsh, Cumberland County, state FFA reporter, who represents FFA on the PYFA Board.
