FFA Receives Funding at Ag Progress Days

ROCK SPRINGS, Pa. — Pennsylvania FFA may enhance their programs thanks funds awarded Tuesday by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA).

The FFA received the funds from Agriculture Secretary Dennis Wolff during Ag Progress Days.

"Our youth are the future leaders of Pennsylvania agriculture, our state's number one industry," said Wolff. "The FFA and encourage youth to explore the many opportunities in agriculture that are available to them. By supporting these programs, we can keep Pennsylvania agriculture growing for generations to come."

State FFA officers accepted \$71,000 in fair funds, which will be divided among 139 chapters that are home to nearly 8,000 students.


Wolff chairs the Fair Advisory Board, which approves the funds yearly from the larger \$4 million Pennsylvania Fair

The ABC's of the Pennsylvania FFA

Acronyms — When you know what they stand for, they make perfect sense and save a little bit of time. However, if you are unfamiliar with acronyms that are constantly being used around you, it's like listening to a different language. The FFA has plenty of acronyms — just look at our name! That is why we have created this "ABC's" guide to the acronyms commonly used in the FFA. Whether you use these acronyms or not, we hope that this list will help you understand what it is that other FFA members are talking about!

ACES — (Agriculture Cooperation Establishes Success) A weekend leadership conference for any FFA member in Pennsylvania. This year's dates are Feb. 9-10 and 16-17 (your adviser will choose which weekend your chapter will attend).

B&G — Blue and Gold Pages. The thing you are reading right now. A page devoted to the Pennsylvania FFA and all the great things that you, the members are doing.

CDE — Career Development Events. Thirty different FFA contests designed to help members apply the skills they have learned in their agriculture classes.

FFA SAFE — FFA Saving Area Farms Effectively. A program designed for FFA chapters to map local farms so that if there is an emergency on the farm, first responders will know where hazards on the farm are located.

MWC — Mid-Winter Convention. Ok, so we don't actually call it MWC, but it fits! Mid-Winter Convention is an afternoon convention held at Farm Show where we hold the Keystone Degree Ceremony.

PAAE — Pennsylvania Association of Agriculture Educators. State organization of agriculture teachers. Your local agriculture teacher is most likely a member of this group.

PALS — Partners in Active Learning Support. Mentoring program that connects high school agriculture students with elementary students with special needs.

POA — Program of Activities. A chapter's schedule of activities for the year as well as their goals for the year.

SAE — Supervised Agricultural

Experience. Individual projects or enterprises that FFA members have as a way to apply the knowledge they have gained from their agriculture classes. There are also SAE requirements for each degree of membership that an FFA member works toward.

SLLC — State Legislative Leadership Conference. A three day conference held in March where members simulate running a bill through the House of Representatives and the Senate as a way of learning about the legislative process.

SOCS — State Officer Candidacy School. Attend this conference to learn what being a State Officer is all about. Learn about the nomination process as well as what it takes to be a state officer.

WLC — Washington Leadership Conference. Leadership conference held in Washington D.C. that teaches personal development and goal setting skills, motivation and citizenship.

WPLC — Western Pennsylvania Leadership Conference. Overnight leadership conference held during the summer which helps members develop teamwork skills and learn about opportunities available in the FFA.



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
