## FFA Member Balances 9 Animal Production Experiences

This month Pennsylvania FFA is highlighting Natasha Maddox, a member of Grand Canyon FFA in Tioga County. During her three years at Wellsboro Area High School, Maddox has served as Grand Canyon's secretary. She also keeps a record of her nine supervised agricultural experiences.

Most notably, Maddox raises and cares for pigeons in her family's business. Her grandparents began the project in 2013 and encouraged Maddox to take part in the project about four years ago.

Since then, she has taken a great deal of responsibility in the pigeons' care including watering, feeding, providing supplements, and even overseeing parts of the breeding process.

Maddox's animal care and production endeavors do not stop with her pigeons. Her other experiences include sheep, goats, meat chickens and steers. She also has projects with rabbits, turkeys, feeder pigs and Wreaths Across America.

Of all her animal SAEs, Maddox prefers working with

her velveteen-eared bunnies because they were her first SAE project. With her FFA, she recently earned best of breed with Cadbury and Baxter, her two FFA rabbits. Recalling her showing experiences, Maddox says, "These opportunities are good for me and great to learn from.'

Maddox will continue learning from these opportunities as she plans to continue her showing journey in Tioga County with hopes of showing at the Pennsylvania Farm Show.

She has attended many events during her FFA career in addition to her involvement with SAE. Some of her favorite parts of being a member of FFA include the Agricultural Cooperation Establishes Success conference, state convention, travel and competition.

"I love FFA because of the wide variety of opportunities that it provides for both students and the community," she said.

Beyond the blue jacket, her career plans are not fully decided, but she hopes to become either a large animal veterinarian or an agriculture educator.
