Members of the Moniteau Chapter shared that their passions for hunting started at an early age, and they have become interested in multiple wildlife species and safety methods. Most members of the group primarily hunt White-Tail deer, but also enjoy the occasional pheasant, rabbit or bird hunt.

Peyton Kohlmeyer, a member of the demonstration group, hoped that attendees would take home key safety rules.

"It's not important about what you bring home, but it is important how safe you come home to your family," he said.
