The week of Feb. 19-26 is a special week for all FFA members and chapters across the nation because it's National FFA Week.

Every year, the national organization guides chapters, members and state associations on how to celebrate FFA throughout the week.

The themes for each day of the week are SAE Sunday, Service and Advocacy Monday, Alumni Tuesday, Ag Teacher Appreciation Wednesday, Give FFA Thursday, and Wear Blue Friday.

This year, Pennsylvania FFA is honored to be hosting Mallory White, national FFA Eastern Region vice president from Kentucky.

As White visits Pennsylvania, she will meet with members of the Pennsylvania House Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee, tour the Milton Hershey School and Hershey's Chocolate World, and meet with superintendents in local school districts to advocate agriculture, agricultural education and the FFA organization.

On Feb. 22, White will travel to Lampeter-Strasburg, Elizabethtown and Penn Manor high school

to conduct personal development workshops followed by a Lancaster County event at the Farm and Home Center.

The weather is a key factor in crop growth. Crops depend on sunlight and a reasonable amount of water. When crops do not get the adequate water and nutrients they need, the quality of the crop decreases.

For many farmers, their livelihood is their livestock. They are counting on healthy animals to raise for production. Farmers care for their animals before they care for themselves.

Animals get fed, and clean bedding and milking, if needed, before the farmer eats his or her own breakfast. Farmers are constantly checking their livestock for any signs of distress.

One farmer feeds 166 people annually.

"The global population is expected to increase by 2.2 billion by 2050, which means the world's farmers will have to grow about 70% more food than what is now produced," according to the American Farm Bureau Federation.

People are reliant on farmers for food, shelter, clothing and so much more.

There are so many misconceptions about the agriculture industry that come from people not involved in production agriculture. This is a growing challenge

as these people become older and begin influencing others.

Farmers have a lot of work to do and are still trying to inform consumers about the truth of the agriculture industry. And we owe it to our farmers, who haven't given up when they face new challenges every day.
