FFA Hosts Leadership Conference

The Pennsylvania FFA state officers were honored to host the State Legislative Leadership Conference. During the conference, over 600 FFA members and advisers from across the state gathered to learn how to advocate and how a bill becomes a law.

During the conference's opening night, members went through workshops on advocacy and dinner etiquette. The students used their knowledge to advocate for a nonprofit organization at the advocacy fair held in the evening.

The students were put into groups of approximately 10 members and given a specific nonprofit organization for which they made a flip chart on two pieces of construction paper

to detail their organization's goal for both money and volunteer hours.

Each group member also received fake money and labeled volunteer hours to give to other advocating organizations throughout the evening.

During the fair, 48 nonprofit organizations were advocated for.

The following day, members and state officers were wide awake for breakfast and the following review on proposed bills from FFA chapters that chose to participate to create more opportunities for the Pennsylvania FFA Association. The bills were then voted on, and the results will be shared in the coming weeks.

Later in the conference, the state officers led parliamentary procedure workshops where students learned how to make a motion and amend bills. The members then split into caucus meetings before being separated into senate minority and senate majority.

Then, the bills were mock amended and changed by the members. The state officers proceeded to chair the committees.

As the conference concluded the following day, the legislative breakfast allowed FFA members to interact with their representatives and senators to talk about their experiences in agriculture and the FFA. The 2023 State Legislative Leadership Conference was a huge success.
